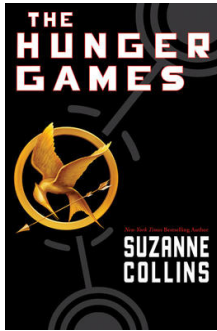

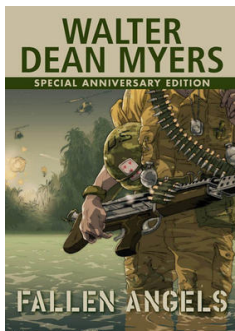


### *The Hunger Games*

In the ruins of a place once known as North America lies the nation of Panem, a shining Capitol surrounded by twelve outlying districts. The Capitol is harsh and cruel and keeps the districts in line by forcing them all to send one girl and one boy between the ages of twelve and eighteen to participate in the annual Hunger Games, a fight to the death on live TV. Sixteen-year-old Katniss Everdeen, who lives alone with her mother and younger sister, regards it as a death sentence when she is forced to represent her district in the Games. But Katniss has also resolved to outwit the creators of the games. To do that she will have to be the last person standing at the end of the deadly ordeal, and that will take every ounce of strength and cunning she has.

Related themes: reality TV, war, love, politics, and death.

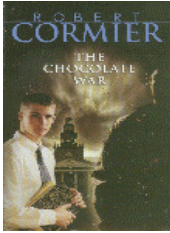

### ***Chocolate War***

Stunned by his mother's recent death and appalled by the way his father sleepwalks through life, Jerry Renault, a New England high school student, ponders the poster in his locker — “Do I dare disturb the universe?”. Part of his universe is Archie Costello, leader of a secret school society — the Vigils — and master of intimidation. Archie though is intimidated by a cool, ambitious teacher into having the Vigils spearhead the annual fund-raising event: a chocolate sale. When Jerry refuses to be bullied into selling chocolates, he becomes a hero, but his defiance is a threat to Archie, the Vigils, and the school. In the inevitable showdown, Archie's skill at intimidation turns Jerry from hero to outcast, to victim, leaving him alone and terribly vulnerable.

Robert Cormier has been called "the single most important writer in the whole history of young adult literature." His many acclaimed books include *The Chocolate War*, *I Am the Cheese*, *After the First Death*, *Beyond the Chocolate War*, *Fade*, *The Bumblebee Flies Anyway*, *We All Fall Down*, *Tunes for Bears to Dance To*, *In the Middle of the Night*, *Other Bells for Us to Ring*, *Eight Plus One*, *Tenderness*, *Heroes*, *Frenchtown Summer* and *The Rag and Bone Shop*. His books have won many awards and have been translated into several languages, becoming modern classics. In 1991 he received the Margaret A. Edwards Award, honouring his lifetime contribution to writing for teens.

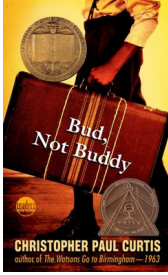
### ***Son of the Mob***

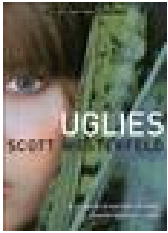

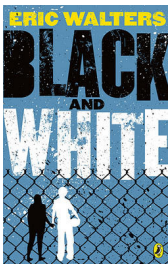
### ***Uglies***

This novel is set in our world hundreds of years later. Our society has been decimated, as well as everything that we know about our planet. The remaining humans are born ugly, and at the age of sixteen, they all receive an operation that makes them pretty.

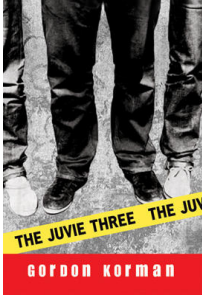


### ***Black and White***

### *The Juvie Three*

Gecko Fosse drove the getaway car.  
Terence Florian ran with the worst gang in Chicago.  
Arjay Moran killed someone.

All three boys are serving time in juvenile detention centres until they get a second chance at life in the form of Douglas Healy. A former juvenile delinquent himself, Healy is running an experimental halfway house in New York City where he wants to make a difference in the lives of kids like Gecko, Terence, and Arjay.

Things are going well, until one night Healy is accidentally knocked unconscious while trying to break up a scuffle among the boys. Terrified of the consequences, they drop him off at a hospital and run away. But when Healy awakes, he has no memory of them or the halfway house. Afraid of being sent back to Juvie, the guys hatch a crazy scheme to continue on as if the group leader never left. They will go to school, do their community service, attend therapy, and act like model citizens until Healy's memory returns and he can resume his place with them.

But life keeps getting in the way...like when Gecko finds romance. Or Arjay gets famous. Or Terence starts reverting to his old ways. If the boys are discovered, their second chance will be their last.

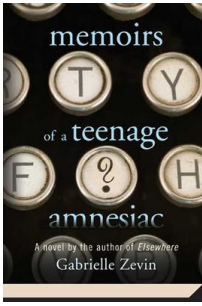

### *Lord of the Flies*

William Golding's classic tale about a group of English schoolboys, who are plane-wrecked on a deserted island, is just as chilling and relevant today as when it was first published in 1954. At first, the stranded boys cooperate, attempting to gather food, make shelters, and maintain signal fires. Overseeing their efforts are Ralph, "the boy with fair hair," and Piggy, Ralph's chubby, wisdom-dispensing sidekick whose thick spectacles come in handy for lighting fires. Although Ralph tries to impose order and delegate responsibility, there are many in their number who would rather swim, play, or hunt the island's wild pig population. Soon Ralph's rules are being ignored or challenged outright. His fiercest antagonist is Jack, the redheaded leader of the pig hunters, who manages to lure away many of the boys to join his band of painted savages. The situation deteriorates as the trappings of civilization continue to fall away, until Ralph discovers that instead of being hunters, he and Piggy have become the hunted: "He forgot his words, his hunger and thirst, and became fear; hopeless fear on flying feet." Golding's gripping novel explores the boundary between human reason and animal instinct, all on the brutal playing field of adolescent competition.
